Message from Mrs Norton

Dear Parents/Carers,

#### Creative Curriculum

We have had a fun-filled fortnight at Thakeham Primary with so many learning opportunities that really do reflect our broad, reach, inspiring curriculum offer. You will see later on in the newsletter that NSPCC Numbers Day was a great success and children were actively engaged in a range of 'real life' money activities. This day was partly inspired by a couple of parents talking to us about their concerns that children grow up in world where they are used to seeing plastic cards being used rather than actual physical money. It is always good to hear your ideas and that of the children's to help inspire and improve our curriculum. Thank you to parents and governors who also joined us to help and find out more about children's learning during the day. Mrs Hopkins once again did a marvellous job of organising this event. Following this we have registered for Nat West's MoneySense project, so we look forward to

finding out how that can further develop our children's 'learning for life' (one of out Curriculum Drivers).

We were impressed with children's responses to our Safer Internet theme this year "Create, Connect and Share Respect: A better internet starts with you." We cannot stress enough how important this aspect of keeping children safe is. Thank you to parents who joined the parent workshop after school, though unfortunately numbers were lower than hoped. See later in the newsletter for more details of this event, which was kindly organised by Mr Penty. Once again one of our governors was able to visit and talk to children about their learning, to see the impact of our school development work.

Another wonderful event was our Science Day. The inspiration, awe and wonder around the school was palpable yesterday. One of our governors visited and was greeted by a 9foot T-Tex and some very excited children! Our workshop visitors really inspired the children, alongside the hands-on practical activities, it was clear that inspired learning was the order of the day! Mrs Byatt did a wonderful job of organising the event.

#### Monitoring

Myself and Mrs Hopkins have been monitoring Maths recently, particularly how effectively teachers plan for the range of needs and abilities within their class. We have been very impressed with the quality of teaching and learning, in some cases there are examples of outstanding practice as we continue our journey to ensure we are an inclusive school. Curriculum Leaders and governors continue to play an important role, visits to classes and groups have helped them assess the impact of a range of school development initiatives. We have also welcomed scrutiny from those outside of the school as was the case last Friday when Mrs Vaughan, Specialist Leader of Education for French, spoke to children in Maple and Elder class with me and looked at evidence in pupil books.

Mrs Baxter (Inclusion Leader) and I have been very impressed with the quality of support provided by our Teaching Assistants. The learning, nurture and care provided by these important individuals cannot be under estimated and our school and our children's learning and well-being benefit hugely from their support and intervention.

#### Sports and Physical Activity

Our children continue to be actively involved in the STARS tasters and tournaments as you will see later on in the newsletter. These are ably led by Miss Killner Brown, our PE leader and supported by our TAs and parents. Work on the trim trail is now complete and following safety sessions with each class regarding safe, sensible use, this equipment will be open to our pupils on Tuesday 20th February, during school time only. Please do not allow your children to use this equipment before/after school. Once again thank you to the hard work of FOTS and parents for their contributions to the cost of this. Well done to the School Council for helping last year to source ideas for the trim trail.

#### Parking

A reminder to consider our neighbours both in the local area and Steyning Grammar School when parking. Another reminder that the coach bay is a drop off zone only for Year 6 pupils. # <u>Science Day</u>

On Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> February Thakeham Primary enjoyed our stunning science day. The children all had the opportunity to explore a range of real life dinosaur fossils, learning how these have helped scientist learn about life on our planet millions of years ago. They were particularly amused to find they had been handling real dinosaur poo! Our visitor in the afternoon was met with huge excitement and cheers from the children. Baby Jack and Milly allowed the children to see what dinosaurs may have looked like in the past and put their understanding from their morning session to good practise!

Acorn Class spent the day experimenting with a range of materials, looking for reactions over time and changes to substances when mixing and moving. Oak explored how animals in the Antarctic keep warm by submerging their hands into blubber and recording what they had found out. They also investigated how penguins keep their feathers water proof.

Maple investigated how the content of a tin would affect its movement as it moved on different surfaces and ramps. They used what they had found to predict the contents of the cans they had been using.

Elder Class looked at the filtering process and were set the challenge of separating the different substances in the solution they had been given, after quickly working out that the solution would not be safe to drink as it was!







### NSPCC Maths Day/Nick Herbert visit

Real Life Maths this year was in conjunction with the NSPCC National Numbers Day. The children spent the day working with money in a range of real life situations. with the objectives of:

recognising the coins
understanding how to exchange money for an item
realising they may receive change and what that would be
developing an understanding of value
working to a budget

The children all had experience of handling money and solving a range of everyday problems. Congratulations to all those who came in a fantastic 'number themed' costume and well done for raising money for such an important charity. MP Nick Herbert was very impressed with our number and money skills—he particularly enjoyed playing Monopoly with Maple Class!

Tuesday the 6<sup>th</sup> of February was Safer Internet Day! Children throughout the school, as well as some parents and governers, celebrated this year's theme: *Create, Connect and Share Respect: A better internet starts with you*.
